

Lindsey's Mississippi Auxiliary parent is her mom, Becky. Lindsey received the two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) EANGUS Auxiliary scholarship in August 2021.

The first EANGUS Auxiliary scholarships were given in 1978 and were for three hundred dollars (\$300.00) each. Since that time the amounts of scholarship awards have increased with the top recipient receiving the scholarship provided by USAA in the amount of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00). Four additional awards are provided by the EANGUS Auxiliary: second place, two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00); third place, one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00); and fourth and fifth places, one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) each. Bost Urges DoD to Clarify Shifting Policy Impacting GI Bill Eligibility

Rep. Mike Bost (R-IL.), the Ranking Member of the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs, released the following statement after sending a letter to Secretary of Defense, Lloyd J. Austin III, regarding National Guard Members' eligibility for GI Bill benefits following the Biden Administration's recent termination of the national emergency declaration at the southern border.

"The Biden Administration's decision to reverse the emergency declaration at the southern border risks national security. It also risks the education of thousands of members of the National Guard who are still deployed there," said Ranking Member Bost. "Secretary Austin must immediately tell us whether those serving at the border since January 20th are receiving the same credit toward the GI Bill that they were on January 19th. Their service has not changed. Their benefits should not change either. The National Guard has stepped up in extraordinary ways over the last year. They have left their families and lives behind to serve on federal duty at the border, in DC, and elsewhere. Every single one of them should receive full GI Bill credit for their service. I stand ready to work with the Secretary to make sure they get exactly that."

The status of servicemembers of the National Guard currently serving at the southern border includes end strength and the statutory authority for their service. Rep. Bost asked for clarification on whether the rescission of Presidential Proclamation 9844 eliminates the ability for members of the National Guard currently serving on the southern border to continue to receive credit towards Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits and, if so, how that is being communicated to them.

As EANGUS members know, we are continually pushing for our well-deserved benefits. We will continue to monitor this situation and ensure everyone is receiving updated information. We will be assisting Rep. Bost with any follow on legislation he feels is needed.

THESE WERE WORKED ON THIS YEAR.



EANGUS has supported extending TRICARE Reserve Select (TRS) to military technicians as a recruiting tool for the military. Additionally, lack of health care coverage is one of the top concerns for readiness and deployability. EANGUS realizes the biggest hurdle with this legislation is the offset of appropriations that is needed for DoD to fund it. However, we believe that the benefit of TRS far exceeds the expense.

TRS was established to increase RC servicemembers' readiness during the early years of the 9/11 activations and provided an affordable health care option for service members. Any changes to health care should be approached as a readiness issue for the service member and a benefit for the family. We also have several other concerns about health care for the RC:

- Military health care records are scattered over several locations (duty station, TDY locations, civilian providers), making it hard, to impossible, to monitor deployable standards.
- Difficulty getting annual physicals during drill weekends due to insufficient manning or personnel.
- Loss or delay in health care coverage when an individual's duty status and orders change, which triggers a different TRICARE program.
- Length of time to complete medical evaluation boards.
- Difficulty processing LODs due to the complexity of the process and review levels required and proving when the injury occurred.
- Inability to provide immediate care to injures due to processing time—this causes longer periods of non-deplorability.

• Servicemembers' inability to receive care through the VA. This process is prolonged due to a lack of attention during injures.

EANGUS believes a more permanent fix would be to cover every participating RC member under a TRICARE Prime Remote-like coverage for the readiness aspect. This would consolidate the health care records into one program and increase the ability to monitor deployable standards. Any annual physicals, shots, etc., would not have to be crammed into a drill weekend. This would free up valuable training time.

When looking at health care as a benefit, the RC member would individually pay for family members when off-orders. For example, when the RC is onorders, they would be given a health care allowance to pay for family member coverage. Covering the health care fees this way ensures the family member status would not change regardless of the RC members' duty status; thus, they would not be dropped or encounter delays from TRS to TRICARE Prime.



The Enlisted Association of the National Guard of the United States (EANGUS). Needs a companion bill in the House of Representatives supporting S. 1291, *The Record of Military Service for Members of the Armed Forces Act of 2021*, introduced by Senator Peters (MI), Senator Lankford (OK), Senator Tester (MT), and Senator Moran (KS).

With the global demand not abating for Reserve Component (Reserves and National Guard) members, more and more citizen warriors are called to duty. Since the Reserve Components are part of the "Total Force," all members, past, and present, be treated equally with the DD 214. This, however, is not the case when it is issued to the RC member.

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Currently, not all Reserve Component (RC) members receive a DD 214 when they are separated, discharged, or retired from military service. This is a problem for RC members because the VA and other federal and state government agencies usually require veterans to provide a copy of the DD 214 to qualify for veteran benefits.

According to VA Pamphlet 26-7, "There is no one form used by the Reserves or National Guard that is like a DD Form 214..." that meets "Proof of Service Requirements" (Chapter 2). By streamlining the DD 214 for RC members, they will receive credit for their entire service.

Proposed change currently in legislation would provide a DD Form 214 at the same career milestones as active duty. This would ensure predictable 214's that reflect a National Guard and Reserve member's entire career. It would also help servicemembers and their families obtain state and federal veteran benefits.



The Enlisted Association of the National Guard of the United States (EANGUS), is hoping to gain support for bill number H.R. 1997 TRICARE Fairness for National Guard and Reserve Retirees Act introduced by Congressman Bill Johnson (R-OH).

The TRICARE Fairness for National Guard and Reserve Retirees Act will show that Congress has recognized the hard work and dedication of the reserve component. It is vital that Congress enacts this legislation, last June there were more than 100,000 reserve component members activated in support of missions worldwide. Their sacrifice will be rewarded by this bill.

The age at which National Guard members begin drawing retired pay is determined differently than for their active-duty counterparts. In both cases, a servicemember's retirement is based on achieving 20 good years or more of service. However, while active-duty members receive their retirement pay immediately, since the 1940s, National Guard and Reserve servicemembers must wait until age 60 to receive military retired pay. There is one exception to that rule. The National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008 (Public Law 110-181) enacted Sec. 647. Commencement of receipt of non-regular service retired pay by members of the Ready Reserve on active Federal status or active duty for significant periods. This legislation reduced the retirement age for RC servicemembers from age 60 to as early as age 50 if they served in an eligible status on or after 29 January 2008. Unfortunately, this legislation only changed when they could receive retired pay, but it did not make the corresponding change to 10 U.S.C. § 1074(b) for them to receive health care upon early age retirement.

Congress did make a subsequent change for early age retirees, but it was to a new plan called TRICARE Retired Reserve (TRR) which is a significantly higher cost plan. As a comparison, the calendar year enrollment fee/premium cost for TRICARE Retired Reserve is <u>\$1,165.01 a month</u> for a family plan. Once the retired reservist reaches age 60, the servicemember and their qualifying family members become eligible for TRICARE Standard, Extra, and Prime (where available). The cost of TRICARE Prime for active and age 60 reserve retirees who began service before January I, 2018 is <u>\$606.00 per year for the family plan</u>.

Public Law 110-181 was passed to recognize National Guard and Reserve contributions to the Global War on Terrorism and to the subsequent loss with their civilian retirement because of long deployments. This law recognized their service, they should not then be penalized with higher health care costs than other retirees.



H.R. 1854, RECRUIT

EANGUS would like you to participate in this Call to Action for H.R. 1854 introduced by Rep Ryan (D-OH) and Rep Palazzo (R-MS). The "Reserve Employers Comprehensive Relief and Uniform Incentives on Taxes Act of 2021" or the "RECRUIT Act of 2021" is an EANGUS legislative priority to encourage employers to hire and retain National Guard and Reserve servicemembers.

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Our association is devoted to helping National Guard with USERRA and SCRA problems, and we are all too familiar with the employment problems they run into from deployments. On the other hand, we cannot blame employers because they also shoulder a burden when Guard and Reserve are on orders. H.R. 1854 provides a tax credit to employers, which we believe will encourage them to hire and retain Reserve Component members. The tax credit will help employers offset the financial cost of hiring temporary employees or paying overtime when servicemembers are absent.



EANGUS Call-To-Action—Equal Hazardous Duty Incentive Pay for National Guard

EANGUS has supported Equal Hazardous Duty Incentive Pay (HDIP) for the National Guard, and we are asking our members to participate in this Call-To-Action.

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The military has many hazardous jobs, and the men and women in these positions qualify for special incentive pay. DoDI 1340.09, Hazard Pay Program states, "HDIP provides a monetary incentive to servicemembers who volunteer to perform a duty designated as hazardous, based upon the inherent dangers of the duty and risks of physical injury." Members of the military who volunteer for these precarious positions include pilots, SEALs, divers, parachutists, and more. The Navy offers special pay for being onboard submarines and working with nuclear energy plants. Jobs that qualify for hazardous duty are deemed more dangerous than others.

To compensate U.S. servicemembers assigned these high-risk duties, the Armed Forces authorizes a special payment that starts at \$150 per month, known as Hazardous Duty Incentive Pay.

National Guard servicemembers DO NOT receive equal pay when it comes to performing these duties. Although requirements are the same for a National Guard servicemember, they are only paid 1/30th of their active-duty counterparts.

37 U.S. Code § 301. Incentive pay: hazardous duty

(f)(1) Under regulations prescribed by the President and to the extent provided for by appropriations, when a member of a reserve component of a uniformed service, or the National Guard, who is entitled to compensation under section 206 of this title, performs, under orders, any duty described in subsection (a) for members entitled to basic pay, he is entitled to an increase in compensation equal to 1/30 of the monthly incentive pay authorized by subsection (b) or (c), as the case may be, for the performance of that hazardous duty by a member of a corresponding grade who is entitled to basic pay. He is entitled to the increase for as long as he is qualified for it, for each regular period of instruction, or period of appropriate duty, at which he is engaged for at least two hours, including that, performed on a Sunday or holiday, or for the performance of such other equivalent training, instruction, duty, or appropriate duties, as the Secretary may prescribe under section 206(a) of this title. This subsection does not apply to a member entitled to basic pay under section 204 of this title for the entire month.

Currently, Active Component members, based on their job, receive a minimum of \$150 a month even though they may only perform the actual hazardous duty for a certain number of days during the month. Reserve Component members also perform a hazardous duty for a certain number of days during the month, but because they are not on 30-day orders, they only receive 1/30th of the incentive pay. EANGUS believes that if the mandatory requirements to qualify for HDIP are precisely the same for all members regardless of Active or Reserve status, then the payment should be equal. Active, National Guard, and Reserve servicemembers all meet the exact mandatory requirements and assume the same risk.

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Equalizing Hazardous Duty Incentive Pay recognizes that the National Guard is responsible for meeting the same deployment standards as their active counterpart. It is better to retain a trained servicemember than incur the expense of training new servicemembers repeatedly. The special training and experience that individuals in these fields possess are vital to the success of our national strategy. Additionally, the leadership skills gained during their career cannot be replaced with recruits.




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Secretary Colin Powell's 13 Rules:

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Different Classes of Membership for the Auxiliary

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

Joe Louis: From boxing gloves to combat boots

The day after he enlisted in the Army, Louis donated \$89,092 to the Navy Relief Society. Louis was known as Private Barrow and was nicknamed "the Brown Bomber." He reached the rank of Staff Sergeant and was awarded the Legion of Merit before his discharge in 1945. A poster of Louis became one of the most popular for war bond



advertisements. Dressed in full combat gear and wielding a rifle with a fixed bayonet, the poster quoted a line from a speech Louis had given at a fundraiser: "We're going to do our part...and we'll win because we're on God's side."






